OSAKA UNIVERSITY SHORT-TERM STUDENT EXCHANGE PROGRAM















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1. What is OUSSEP?

The Osaka University Short-term Student Exchange Program (OUSSEP) was launched in the 1996-97 academic year at Osaka University as an English speaking exchange program for those who have difficulties earning credits in Japanese. In this OUSSEP scheme, the participants have been offered special academic lectures taught in English under the close coordination of the Center for International Education and Exchange (hereafter referred to as the CIEE).

The University grants credits to the students who attend OUSSEP, for the courses they take at Osaka University, and presents a certificate of completion to the students who successfully meet the program requirements. The credits can be transferred to the student's home university according to the provisions included in the pertinent inter-institutional exchange agreement.

The Osaka University English speaking program will admit more than fifty students who opt to study a variety of subjects such as medical sciences, natural sciences, engineering sciences, social sciences, arts and foreign studies. Students who participate in these programs will likely attend the same classes, join several extracurricular activities together and develop very close friendships amongst themselves. Needless to say, they will also make friends with Japanese students. Students are expected to earn at least 14 credits in each semester (28 credits annually), from lectures in English, Independent Study and Japanese language classes, then transfer the credits to their home institutions.

OUSSEP: Full-year and Half-year Programs

Students who enroll in OUSSEP are from a variety of countries around the world and study in a unique international environment. They come with different cultural backgrounds and various academic majors. In the nineteenth academic year of the program (Fall semester of OUSSEP 2014-2015) seventy five students were admitted from forty four universities in twenty three countries. Asia, Oceania, North America, Latin America and Europe were represented among the students. Students have a choice of participating in the program for two semesters (Full-year OUSSEP) or one semester only (Half-year OUSSEP). Although the regular OUSSEP semester starts at the end of September, if necessary, OUSSEP accepts a certain number of the enrollments in April. In so doing, this allows participants the flexibility of choosing the best duration and period for their studies at Osaka University.

Studying Japanese

OUSSEP is an English speaking program which caters to students with a variety of backgrounds. Although students may take elective Japanese classes, three classes per week, the program is not suitable for those who wish to study Japanese intensively in Japan, such as more than four classes per week. If your main purpose for the exchange is to develop your Japanese language skills or to enhance your cultural knowledge of Japan, consider joining Maple, instead of OUSSEP.

FrontierLab@OsakaU, Maple and iExPO Programs

In addition to the Full-year OUSSEP and Half-year OUSSEP courses, there are other types of short-term (i.e. less than one academic year) exchange opportunities at Osaka University.

FrontierLab@OsakaU is a specially designed exchange program, which offers laboratory experiences for science/engineering major students. Participants may join the laboratory activities, according to their research interests as one of the team members, and then concentrate on their subjects under the supervision of Osaka University professors. ♦ Maple

At Osaka University of Foreign Studies (hereafter referred to as OUFS), a specially designed international exchange program for Japanese learners, known as the Maple program, was launched in the 1999-2000 academic year, and has been popular amongst non-Japanese students who wished to study the Japanese language and culture.

This program has now been reorganized and is known as Maple and is administered by the Center for Japanese Language and Culture (hereafter referred to as CJLC). For more details of the Maple program, see the URL below.

♦ iExPO

In the iExPO (Immersion Exchange Program Osaka), schools and graduate schools at Osaka University accept international students from institutions with an exchange agreement with OU. Students are able to freely choose classes from courses there and conduct research under the guidance of a teacher. However, international students in this program are required to have a good level of fluency in the Japanese language in order to take classes for regular students. Students joining this program can take classes or receive research guidance at the school or graduate school as special auditors or research students without a change in their status at their home university.


In the case of student exchange under Inter-University Exchange Agreements, an Osaka University

Inter-University Exchange Application Package must be obtained by the student at the international exchange office of the student's home institution. The International Student Affairs Division of Osaka University deals with the admission of exchange students, in cooperation with its counterparts in partner institutions. In the case of exchange under Inter-Faculty Exchange Agreements, contact should be made through the relevant office of the faculty of the student's home institution and the individual school or graduate school of Osaka University. Profile of Osaka University

Osaka University's historical roots originated from a Liberal Arts College for Osaka merchants in the eighteenth century (1724) and School of Dutch Studies in the nineteenth century (1838). Osaka University was officially founded in 1931 by the Japanese Government with strong support from local governments in the Osaka area. It was established with the aim of creating a center of higher education

inheriting the liberal and progressive academic tradition of the Osaka area that had been the center of trade for the nation for many centuries.

In April of 2004, it became one of 84 National University Incorporations founded under the National University Law that resulted from the recent national university reform plan in Japan. OU was divided into two main campuses, Toyonaka and Suita. At Toyonaka, there are the Schools of Science, Engineering Science, Letters, Law, Economics and several Graduate Schools. The Institute of Higher Education and Practice and other research institutions are also located on the Toyonaka campus. At Suita, there are the Schools of Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmaceutical Science, Engineering, Human Sciences and several Graduate Schools. The University's Main Administration Office and many research and educational institutions, including the Center for International Education and Exchange (CIEE) are also located on the Suita campus.

OUFS was first established in December 1921 in downtown Osaka, Uehonmachi, and was committed to international peace and friendship. Financially it was helped by a large donation from Choko Hayashi, an Osaka business woman. Having survived the Second World War, it moved to the city of Takatsuki, a northern suburb of Osaka, and then back to Uehonmachi. In 1979, it moved again to a new location in Minoh City for more extensive academic activities. On October 1, 2007, OUFS became a part of Osaka University as the School of Foreign Studies and some other institutions, such as the Center for Japanese Language and Culture (CJLC). OUFS's Minoh campus became Osaka University's third main campus, the Minoh campus, where the School of Foreign Studies and CJLC are located.

Osaka University is now (as of January, 2015) comprised of eleven undergraduate schools, sixteen graduate schools, twenty eight research institutes and centers (including CIEE and CJLC), four main libraries and two hospitals attached to the Faculty of Medicine and the School of Dentistry. Furthermore, the University maintains a downtown extension, the Nakanoshima Center, and four overseas offices: in the US (San Francisco), in the Netherlands (Groningen) in Thailand (Bangkok) and in China (Shanghai). Top Global University Project

The Japanese government formulated the 300,000 International Students Plan in July of 2008, with the aim of receiving 300,000 international students by 2020. The "Global 30" Project for Establishing Core Universities for Internationalization is being implemented to realize this goal by selecting measures for the internationalization of universities including the recruitment of international students, along with forming Japan's centers of internationalization. In 2009, thirteen universities, including Osaka University, were selected as core institutions of the Global 30 project. These core universities have played a major role in dramatically boosting the number of the international students educated in Japan. Succeeding the successful Global 30 Project, in late September 2014, Osaka University was, again, selected as one of the 13 Top Global University Project institutes, which were awarded generous ten-year financial support from the Japanese government to increase academic credentials, research competitiveness and global recognition amongst the top research universities in the world. Top Global University Project selected institutes are expected to develop cutting-edge research and provide world-class education. With respect to the Osaka University project, OUSSEP has been considered as one of the indispensable programs for the internationalization of the university.

3. Coordination and Administration

Coordination and Administration

Students who attend the OUSSEP program must be enrolled in one of the undergraduate* or graduate schools** of Osaka University as a Special Auditor*** . The International Affairs Committee, which is made up of faculty members representing a variety of the University's institutions, is responsible for the management of OUSSEP. The Center for International Education and Exchange (CIEE) is in charge of coordinating the program and takes care of the students in collaboration with the institutions. Faculty members, who belong to the CIEE, are appointed as the OUSSEP and international exchange coordinators.

***A "Special Auditor" refers to an exchange student who attends classes and is graded on course work, exams, etc., but does not pursue a degree at Osaka University.

Since the foundation of the original OUSSEP program in 1996, the University has offered a series of lecture courses (2 credits each) in English, taught by academic staff from various faculties of the University. Titles and a brief description of the courses to be given in the Fall semester of 2015 and the Spring semester of 2016 are listed on pages 21-24.

Osaka University has officially designated these courses as International Exchange Subjects. They are designed for OUSSEP program participants and are taught in English. Enrolment in the courses is open to both international students and domestic students to allow for all of them to study in a truly international environment.

Students may select their classes according to their major and interests, (the academic level of lectures is mainly geared towards 3rd year undergraduate students) however, students are also encouraged to take courses outside their own major. This will help them to broaden their perspectives and at the same time gain a deeper understanding of Japanese society and culture. The courses cover a wide variety of subjects from culture to science and technology. The students, both domestic and international, will also learn about Osaka and Japan. We believe this will help students to understand the world and the importance of international awareness and mutual respect. This program underscores the motto of Osaka University: (Live Locally, Grow Globally)

Due to the fact that we can offer only a limited number of courses taught in English, but also try to satisfy students of different majors and from different universities in different countries, the courses often cannot help but be broad in scope. Truly specialized studies are also possible by taking the Independent Study Course. What is more, two credits from the regular courses can be included towards the requirement of 14 credits per semester for the completion of OUSSEP.

4. What Will I Study in OUSSEP?

Structure of the Program

The International Exchange subjects are offered by a variety of faculties, which are designed for mainly 3rd year undergraduate students. OUSSEP coordinators of the CIEE are in charge of the arrangements / coordination of the subjects.

i) International Exchange Subjects

In this English speaking program, the University tries to equalize the number of students majoring in the fields of the physical sciences including engineering and health sciences, and humanities and the social sciences. Students may select their courses according to their major and interests. At the same time, students are encouraged to take courses outside their own major as this will help them to broaden their perspective and at the same time gain a deeper understanding of Japanese society and culture. All participants are expected to earn at least 14 credits from International Exchange Subjects per semester.

ii) Independent Study

One of the unique features of the Full-year and Half-year OUSSEP programs is the Independent Study aspect (2 credits per semester). Students can propose a study topic and are then assigned to a supervising professor in an appropriate faculty. A student may wish to study a particular subject that is not found in the International Exchange Subjects (Individual Study) or to conduct a research project on a particular theme (Independent Research). The student and their supervising professor will agree upon the scope and depth of the study at the beginning of the program.* With respect to Full-year OUSSEP students, the study usually continues for two semesters. At the end of each semester the student will submit a report on his/her topic to the supervising professor. Refer to the "Guide to Independent Study" found at the OUSSEP Website for further details. Those who wish to undertake Independent Study must fill out the Independent Study Proposal along with the other application documents.

*When the amount of work required for the study is particularly large, the supervising professor and the International Affairs Committee may decide to grant up to 4 credits for graduate students instead of 2 credits per semester for Independent Study. Refer to the "Guide to Independent Study" for details.

Arrangements for Independent Study (Full-year and Half-year OUSSEP)

OUSSEP coordinators of the CIEE are in charge of the arrangements with supervising professors for Independent Study for Full-year and Half-year OUSSEP students. Appointing the most appropriate professor for each student according to their Independent Study Proposal is a very time consuming process. It is therefore imperative that students wishing to do Independent Study apply to do so in their original applications, as it is usually too late for the CIEE to make any additional arrangements once the students have arrived.

iii) CIEE Japanese Language Course

In addition to the aforementioned courses, OUSSEP students may take any of the four levels of Japanese courses (4 credits each semester), according to their proficiency level. Students must take a placement test following which, Japanese language classes will take place three times a week.

Completion of the OUSSEP Program

All the courses offered for Full-/Half-year OUSSEP including the Japanese language and Independent Study are electives.

Students select and register for the courses of their choice at the beginning of each semester. The minimum requirement in each semester for satisfactory completion of the OUSSEP program is 14 credits. The International Affairs Committee of Osaka University will award Certificates of Completion to those students who have successfully completed the Full-year OUSSEP. As for Half-year OUSSEP students, the participants will receive a (Half-year) Certificate of Completion issued by the International Affairs Committee if they take more than 14 credits during the semester.

Besides the International Exchange Subjects, Independent study and CIEE Japanese Language, the University will count two of the Osaka University's regular credits towards the completion of OUSSEP.

International Exchange Activities

In addition to the academic programs, students are encouraged to participate in various international exchange activities throughout the year, which the CIEE organizes. Other groups including those within the University (such as the student-organized international exchange group of Brothers and Sisters Program (BSP)), as well as those in neighboring communities, also participate in these programs. One example of a neighboring community group is the Osaka University Host Family Program (OHP), which is coordinated by the CIEE and provides international students with an opportunity to closely interact with a local Japanese family living nearby the university.

Field Trips

The OUSSEP program offers field trips for students in order to give them opportunities to see as many things and to meet as many people as possible during their full-year or half-year stay in Japan. They go on trips as a part of the academic courses, including overnight trips, to different parts of the country to meet local people and experience local cultures.

Academic Calendar

The academic year for regular educational programs in most Japanese universities, including Osaka University, begins in April and ends in March. However, the OUSSEP year which is divided into two 15-week semesters, runs from late September until early August of the following year. Half-year OUSSEP participants will join either of these 15-week semesters; September-February or April-August.

5. How Do I Apply to OUSSEP?

Admission Requirements

To be eligible for OUSSEP, the applicant must:

- Be enrolled in one of the universities and colleges that have concluded Inter-University (or Inter-Faculty) Student Exchange Agreements with Osaka University, including the provisions for mutual tuition waiver and credit transfer.
- Normally, be a junior or senior (3rd or 4th year) full-time student in an undergraduate course 2. at his/her home institution during his/her study duration as an **OUSSEP** student.
- Pay tuition fees to his/her home institution during his/her study duration as an **OUSSEP** student.
- 4. Be recommended by the academic staff of his/her home institution.
- Return to his/her home institution upon completion of **OUSSEP**.

Knowledge of the Japanese language is not an essential requirement for students of the OUSSEP programs: Full-year OUSSEP and Half-year OUSSEP.

Applicants of these English speaking courses must, however, be proficient in English. A TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) score of 550 or higher on the paper based test (PBT), or 80 or higher on the internet based test (iBT), is a prerequisite for students from non-English speaking countries. Other internationally recognizable tests, such as IELTS 6.0 or higher, TOEIC 750 or higher, CPE or CAE, can be considered. If your main purpose for the exchange is to develop your already acquired Japanese language skills, consider joining other programs, such as Maple, instead of OUSSEP.

Application Process

1.

Students interested in OUSSEP should first consult their academic adviser and student exchange officer. On approval by the adviser, applicants should obtain the necessary forms from their university or college office. These should be completed and submitted, through the same office, to Osaka University together with supporting documents.

The following documents are required:

A completed **OUSSEP** application form(refer to Form: Appl).

- 1 A short essay of approximately 500 words in total outlining the student's rationale for joining the **OUSSEP** Program.
- 2 Those who apply for the Independent Study should submit an Independent Study Form and proposal of the topic for the Independent Study.
 - *Approximately 500 words in total.
- ③ A Financial Resources Confirmation.
 - *Fill out on the web. After filling it out on the web, print yourself out a copy.
 - *Bank letters or other kinds of financial certificates should be sent after the students get the acceptance letters.

- At least two letters of recommendation written by faculty members of the home institution. 2. Only one letter from a language instructor is acceptable. These letters should be written in either Japanese or English on the home institution's letterhead.
- 3. Academic transcripts.
- 4. Certificate of English Language Proficiency (Applicants from non-English speaking countries).
- A Certificate of Enrollment at Home Institution with Institution's Seal.
- Verification of unofficial acceptance (If applicable).

All documents above must be written in English, except for the recommendation letters.

Original and Authentic Documents/Signatures

The University requires hand-written signatures in the application forms. The University also strictly requires all of the supporting documents to be original ones. Without proper authorization or authentic documents, it is not possible for the University to recognize the applicants as being serious enough and qualified candidates for the exchange.

In this way, the entire application process shall not be completed until the University receives the printed out application with hand-written signatures and original supporting documents. We do not accept photocopied or scanned supporting documents except for TOEFL/IELTS certificates.

Also, it is essential that all of the communications, including the submission of the application forms should be done between the coordinator of Osaka University and that of partner institutions. The University shall reject any applicants, who apply to the program without any recognition from their home university.

Selection Process for the 2015 Fall and 2016 Spring Enrollment

The International Affairs Committee of Osaka University will be responsible for selecting the students to be admitted to OUSSEP. In May (fall semester enrolment) or in December (spring semester enrolment), Osaka University will notify the home universities of the results of the preliminary selection. Through the communications with exchange coordinators of partner institutions, we may require some applicants to reconsider the programs to be participated in, in order to optimize our educational resources and to offer the best program for each applicant according to his/her skills and/or purpose of his/her exchange.

After that, we will request each of those selected to submit a confirmation of his/her intention to come to OUSSEP.

Understand that withdrawal from the OUSSEP program of any applicant after this point will be highly detrimental to the program.

Nominations to OUSSEP at Home

- ☐ Applicant must be nominated as one of the OUSSEP applicants at home institution.
- ☐ Applicant must have discussed their exchange plans with their coordinator and supervisor.
- ☐ Coordinator supervises the applicants' preparations, and distributes password for the PDF application to each applicant.
- We strongly recommend applicants to prepare well for the application documents before they fill-out the PDF formatted application system.
- 2. Applicants are expected to have calculated their JASSO GPA scores as well.
- 3. An applicant then will get a PDF formatted application, with their personal information, proposed programs, duration, essay, finance supporter's information and so on.
- 4. Those who would like to take the Independent Study option must prepare for independent study proposal.
 - * In that process, applicants may use Osaka University's Research database, in order to identify which Osaka University professor supervises a particular topic, in which the applicant is interested.

- 5. Osaka University naturally expects, all of the PDF formatted application forms are printed out by applicants, and signed by applicants and coordinators, using a pen or ball-point pen.
- 6. The University and JASSO shall not accept any documents without appropriate written confirmation or confirmation signatures using erasable pencils.



Send Hard-copy Forms to Osaka University through the Office

- ☐ Coordinator collects the completed paper application forms and other supporting documents from individual students.
- ☐ Coordinator checks and certifies the application documents by his/her own signature.
- ☐ Coordinator sends the documents to Osaka University by post or international courier services.

- Student exchange is an inter-university business. So that those who are not nominated by student exchange coordinator / officer shall be automatically disqualified.
- 2. If you are short-listed as an OUSSEP 2015-2016 applicant from your institution, read the OUSSEP Calendar carefully (this leaflet) and understand the characteristics of this English speaking program.
- Obtain password from coordinator.
- 4. Those who apply from non-English speaking countries need TOEFL scores of 550 (PBT), 213 (CBT), 80(iBT), 6.0 (IELTS) or higher.



Preparations on the Computer

- ☐ Prepare well for the documents, such as Personal Information, GPA calculation, Essay and Research Proposals, beforehand.
- ☐ Use a computer with internet access, which OS is either Windows Vista or higher (Windows) or MAC OS X 10.5 or higher (MAC)
- ☐ Using password, open the Osaka University PDF application form.



Preliminary Submission through Internet

- ☐ Copy and Paste from the documents you have prepared for the Osaka University PDF application form.
- ☐ Once you fill-out the form, save the application as a PDF and send it to exchange@ciee.osaka-u.ac.jp
- ☐ At this stage, Osaka University recognizes you as a potential OUSSEP candidate, but without the process below, you shall not be short-listed as a qualified OUSSEP 2015-16 candidate.



Written Confirmation / Authorizations

- ☐ Print-out the PDF forms, revise the entire application format.
- ☐ Then fill-out the appropriate slots in your own hand writing. Use a Pen or Ball-point pen.
- ☐ Ask your supervisor to sign the document as well.
- Before submitting the documents to the international office of your home institution, confirm whether your documentations are sufficiently
- 2. Osaka University never accepts any OUSSEP application sent by individual applicants. All OUSSEP applications must be posted by exchange coordinators / international officers with their appropriate authorizations.
- Documents must arrive at Osaka University no later than March 25, 2015 (Fall Enrollment) or November 10, 2015 (Spring Enrollment).

6. How Do I Apply for Financial Aid?

Tuition Waiver

The tuition fee for the degree courses at Osaka University is currently 14,400 JPY per credit. The fee is liable to change without notice. Students from institutions that have concluded a mutual tuition waiver contract with Osaka University will be granted a tuition waiver.

Student Exchange Support Program (Scholarship for Short-Term Study in Japan)

Prospective OUSSEP students whose academic record is GPA 2.30(see below) or above are eligible to apply for the following scholarship offered by the Japanese government, namely the Japan Student Services Organization (JASSO). However, those who receive financial aid from other sources, worth 80,000 JPY or more, are not eligible to apply for the scholarship from JASSO. Please also note that in the present financial climate, qualifying for JASSO scholarships has become more difficult.

Under these circumstances, as a general rule, Osaka University allocates JASSO scholarships, a monthly stipend of about 80,000 JPY to each scholarship awardee under the following rules:

- 1. Osaka University will not award more than two JASSO scholarships to the applicants who are sent from the same university.
- 2. Osaka University prioritizes Full-year OUSSEP students over Half-year participants.

We request applicants to refrain from applying for JASSO scholarships concurrently with other Japanese universities.

In order to receive a grant from JASSO, applicants must satisfy JASSO's General Pass Average (hereafter referred to as GPA) markings of 2.30 out of 3.0 JASSO GPA.

8. How Do I Obtain a Student VISA?

Ryugaku (Student) Visa

Before coming to Japan, students who have been accepted need to obtain a "student" (Ryugaku) visa, issued by the Japanese Embassy or Consulate, in their country of residence.

We will send a letter of acceptance to students who are officially accepted to OUSSEP. At this time, Osaka University will request the Japanese Immigration Bureau to issue a Certificate of Eligibility for Status of Residence (CESR) for each of the students. Only the CESR document will serve as proof of status when applying for a visa to enter Japan as a student.

The Process of obtaining a CESR takes time and the certificate usually does not come through until the end of August (for fall semester)/the middle of March (for spring semester). We will forward the CESR by an express courier service to each student's address as indicated in the OUSSEP Application Form. Therefore, please make sure to write the address that you can certainly receive CESR by postal mail in the **OUSSEP** Application Form.

It is therefore important that applicants provide us with accurate information about their address, including the street address, phone, fax numbers, and an e-mail address.

Each applicant should follow the advice of the Japanese diplomatic office in his/her home country concerning the procedure for obtaining an appropriate visa.





9. Life In Osaka

Housing

Osaka University will have a room ready for each of the participants by the time they arrive. Osaka University will make its best effort to provide the OUSSEP program participants with reasonably priced accommodation in one of the University residences for overseas students located near the three campuses. Due to an increase in demand for campus dormitories by international students, however, we have to optimize the University resources for the most appropriate students. Needless to say, Osaka University's International Student Affairs Division will certainly help all well qualified exchange students to find relatively reasonably priced accommodation.



Senri Aoyamadai UR Flat

Well equipped off-campus apartments are offered for limited numbers of international students, who study in the OUSSEP program. Since the 2011 period, OUSSEP operates off-campus accommodations in collaboration with UR (Urban Housing Agency). In principle, the OUSSEP coordinator allocates JASSO scholarship awardees for the UR Senri-Aoyamadai Flat. The residents share an apartment flat among three OUSSEP students, and reside with Japanese people of the local community. Off-campus UR Flat residents can experience real Japan and exchanges with Japanese people.

Those who wish to stay in a private apartment house in the Osaka area should expect their average monthly living expenses (food, rent, and transportation) to be no less than 120,000 JPY. The University does not currently arrange home-stays for exchange students.

Note that, in principle, those who decide not to live in the university arranged rooms, are no longer eligible to apply to the same kind of university organized rooms again. Those who need special considerations with their accommodation, such as the physically handicapped, please inform us in advance.

Any students who prefer staying in private accommodation not arranged by the university, please inform us, but be advised that contracts with private housing agencies will be the sole responsibility of the student.

Health and Liability Insurance

Upon arrival in the Osaka area, OUSSEP students must join three insurance plans arranged by the University, which includes the compulsory National Health Insurance (NHI), the Disaster and Accident Insurance for Student Education and Research (PAS) and the Comprehensive Insurance for Students Life coupled with PAS. These plans cover medical care and hospitalization. The cost is reasonable and will be the responsibility of the students. In addition, students are expected to have overseas travelers' personal accident insurance. It is the students' own responsibility to obtain that insurance in order to cover their own risk. OU staff and OUSSEP coordinators collect information of insurance details of each participant during orientation.

Some students may have already bought international insurance in their home countries, and are not pleased to have to join the above plan provided by the University. Note that in the event they need personalized certified translations for their own insurance companies, such as medical certificates or police accident reports, the University is not able to translate these official documents. Students will need to find professional translation services by themselves outside the University. Also, note that you should pay the medical fees at first by yourself, and after you have got receipts, you should ask for refunds from the insurance companies by yourself, even if you have joined an international insurance policy in your home countries.










12. Terminologies

Following is an explanation of some of the abbreviations and terminology used in the OUSSEP program

OUSSEP: This stands for Osaka University Short-term Student Exchange Program.

CESR: Certificate of Eligibility for Status of Residence. This is necessary for an overseas student to get a student visa. In order to receive the document, the OUSSEP participants are expected to follow the instructions of OU's International Student Affairs Division, once they get official letters of admission..

CIEE: Center for International Exchange and Education. This Center was founded in 1992, and has been responsible for the coordination of student exchange at OU. The programs on this calendar are entirely coordinated by CIEE staff. It also provides Japanese classes for Full- (/Half-year) OUSSEP students for up to three classes per week.

CJLC: Center for Japanese Language and Culture. In 1954, the Center was first established as the Special Course for Foreign Students at OUFS. In 2005, the institution was renamed as the CJLC. It provides International Exchange Subjects (English) in Japanese studies and core Japanese language classes for Maple students. It is also responsible for the Maple educational program. (Refer Maple)

Full-year OUSSEP: An English speaking program two semesters in length focused on the majors of participants as well as other academic subjects. It is not suitable for those who wish to study Japanese more than 3 classes per week.

Half-year OUSSEP: An English speaking program that runs for one semester only. It is focused on the majors of participants as well as other academic subjects. It is not suitable for those who wish to study Japanese more than 3 classes per week.

International Exchange Subject: Special academic lectures taught in English and administrated by the International Affairs Committee. Domestic students may attend the classes with OUSSEP students. CJLC's courses offering Japanese studies are also included in this category.

JASSO: Japan Student Services Organization. The main funding body of the OUSSEP program: http://www.jasso.go.jp/index_e.html

Maple: A program focused on the Japanese language and culture. CJLC is responsible for its academic content and day to day operations with participants, such as the offering of individual academic advice. (Refer CJLC)

OU: Osaka University

OUFS: (former) Osaka University of Foreign Studies

TOEFL: Test of English as a Foreign Language. PBT refers to Paper Based Test. PBT 550 is almost equal in proficiency to CBT (Computer Based Test) 213 and iBT (internet Based Test) 80 score range. http://www.ets.org/toefl/>

Application Deadline:

Fall of 2015 Enrollment / March 25,2015 (by post) Spring of 2016 Enrollment / November 10,2015 (by post) **Documents must arrive at Osaka University no later** than the above dates.

Individual students should refrain from sending inquiries directly to Osaka University. The OUSSEP program (Full-year OUSSEP, Half-year OUSSEP) is an inter-institutional exchange program. Students should therefore direct inquiries to the relevant office at their home institutions. The application should be sent as a complete package containing all of the necessary documentations. Please use the application check-list. It is important that applicants provide us with accurate information about their vacation address, including street address, phone and fax numbers as well as an e-mail address. 


