Course Objective	This course is designed to introduce you to major theoretical perspectives in sociology and relate theories to our everyday life. The course will cover contemporary sociological theories, and we will study how they can be implemented in sociological research. In particular, we will cover main concepts from the Western and non-Western (Japanese, Islamic, Latin American, African, and South Asian) contemporary theoretical approaches, such as Jürgen Habermas, Paulo Freire, postcolonial theories, feminist theories and so on. A special focus of this course is on the application of those theories to current social issues.
