Type of Class	Lecture Subject
Course Objective	In this course students will study about current migration issues. We will cover key terminology used to describe and study migration, as well as past and present international migration flows. Then you will be introduced to how migration has been studied in different disciplines, such as sociology, anthropology, history, political science, economics, geography, etc. After that, we will look at different types of migration to explore the reasons why people migrate, discuss questions of integration and multiculturalism and examine the policies states implement to regulate migration. These topics will then be further investigated through focusing on Japan, the EU, and USA as examples.
