Course Objective	The countries of East Asia offer a large variety of political structures that affect the way they interact with their citizens and with each other. This course serves as a broad survey of their constitutional, legal, and electoral systems as they relate to the workings of the government and the activities of their civil societies. To cover as much as possible, this course divides the countries of the region within typology of regimes: closed autocracies, electoral authoritarianism, defective democracies, and stable democracies. This course also look at the region as a whole, concerning the formation of regional ties and the protection of their peoples.
