1) Overviews of Internship Course Course 2

This internship consists mainly of activities at Ishibashi Shopping Street and “Ishibashi Commons”, a non-profit organization that conducts social and academic collaboration projects (activities that connect society and universities) in various areas of the Kansai region, with a focus on Ishibashi Shopping Street in Ikeda City, Osaka Prefecture. There will also be opportunities to visit various local communities that can provide useful insights into Japanese society.

Ishibashi Shopping Street is a historic commercial area that developed around Ishibashi Handai-mae Station on the Hankyu Line and is closely associated with Osaka University. In Ishibashi Shopping Street, local people and Osaka University cooperate in various community revitalization activities. In the Ishibashi area, local stores that are not part of large chains play a central role in organizing events of all sizes, from small daily events to large seasonal events. Specific activities can be found on the shopping street's website.

For Ishibashi Commons, the concept of social integration is very important. In their activities, they work with people who are excluded from society or who face challenges that are difficult to highlight. In particular, participants of this course have the opportunity to work with people with disabilities and other minorities in Japanese society. Occasionally, they may visit sensitive sites, thus participants are expected to conduct their internship activities with mutual respect.

Possible local communities to visit include schools and other educational institutions, volunteer centers, welfare facilities, temples, and so on. The sites to be visited will be determined flexibly through discussions between participants, representatives, and faculty members during the internship.

Towards the end, students will plan and give a final presentation to the local communities based on what they learned from the internships at the shopping street and Ishibashi Commons. Participants will be expected to deepen their knowledge and understanding of Japanese social welfare and regional activities through their experiences with local volunteer work and work training as well as event planning.

4) Course content

- ① Induction courses regarding community volunteer activities in Japan (e.g. the structure of minority support systems in Japan, creating inclusive working environments, intercultural communication, basic Japanese language training for daily conversation, etc.) will be provided.
- ② Planning events for regional revitalization (e.g. planning events as an international student, English learning support for children, other events for intercultural understanding, etc.) will be required.

5) Learning Outcomes

In this class students will:

- 1. be able to build human relationships through communication with local people (personalization) [Skills/Attitude];
- 2. know and be able to explain practical examples of inclusive environment development through interactions with people working for the community [Knowledge];
- 3. be able to recognize the actual situation and problems of social exclusion in Japan through interactions with people involved in this issue [Knowledge]; and
- 4. be able to express one's own opinion on social issues in Japan from an individual standpoint [Skills and Attitude].

6) Course Schedule

This program may be adjusted depending on student interest and the situation.

Mornings: volunteer activities in Ishibashi shopping district.

Afternoons: fieldwork and activities in the local areas.

One-day activities are also planned.
