Course Objectives / 授業の目的と 概要	In this course, students will critically examine a range of issues that have shaped the contemporary global landscape of education. First, the course will focus on issues in higher education characterized by increased global connectivity, competition and collaboration. After that, we will look into the growing marketization of education, as well as neoliberalism as the dominant framework shaping educational policies over the last three to four decades. Finally, the case of Japanese education will be taken up to exemplify the impact of globalization on local education structures.
