Course Objectives	Japanes develop complet these th belief th nihonjin homewo	The topic of this course is a comparison of the nihonjinron (theories about the uniqueness of Japanese and Japanese culture) and Western social theory. The nihonjinron is the only complex of social theories which was developed in a non-Western context. Key concepts of the nihonjinron are taken from the Japanese language completely independent of the 'universal' scientific concepts that have their roots in the West. By comparing these theories we are not only challenging our ideas and stereotypes of Japanese culture but also the Western belief that we can explain everything with ethnocentric Western theories. The major concepts and theories of the nihonjinron will be introduced. This is an interactive lecture-type course. Students are required to complete homework assignments prior to class, to contribute frequently to class discussions, to make presentations, and to write a final paper.					
Learning Goals	1	At the end of this course, students should be able to: (i) know the major theories of the nihonjinron and social theories, (ii) compare, contrast and critically analyze theories, (iii) understand how culture influenced the development of different theoretical traditions, and (iv) challenge their taken-forgranted ideas about the world.
