The course will cover contemporary sociological theories, and we will study how they can be implemented in sociological research. In particular, we will cover main concepts from the Western and non-Western (Japanese, Islamic, Latin American, African, and South Asian) contemporary theoretical approaches, such as Jürgen Habermas, Paulo Freire, postcolonial theories, feminist theories and so on. A special focus of the course is on the application of those theories to current social issues.
